


# **DECOLONIZING**the Internet's Languages

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#### What do we care about?

- 130 million books have been published in only about 480 languages (of the 7000+ languages that exist).
- 7% of the world's languages are captured in published material, and an even smaller fraction digitised.



#### What do we care about?

- 59% of the world is online
- 75% of those online are from the Global South
- 45% of all women are online
- 10 of the 7000+ world languages make up 84.3 percent of people using the Internet (English and Chinese dominate)


The internet does not look or sound like most of us in the world.





## Unicode's language

Unicode Sinhala does not allow you to insert combined letters







A Sinhala letter that is becoming non-existent as no keyboards recognise it
